



#### Introduction

- The Department of Psychiatry launched the new Clinician Scholar Program in 2021 to support the training of psychiatry residents interested in pursuing academic careers in education scholarship, quality improvement (QI), and other creative professional activity (CPA), including the social sciences and humanities.
- In 2020, we performed an environmental scan on the literature and existing postgraduate medical education (PGME) programs that offer similar training to residents in education scholarship, QI, and/or CPA.

## **Objectives**

• To provide an insight for curriculum development in the Clinician Scholar Program with considerations for seminar topics, project concepts, evaluation methods, and networking opportunities for residents.

#### Methods

- We conducted an updated literature review in September 2021 to identify existing PGME programs that train residents on key skills and competencies related to education scholarship, QI, and/or CPA.
- Published articles were identified using PubMed and Scopus databases.


