

Quick Takes: Bringing Medical Education Directly to Physicians' Ears Through Podcasting

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Background

Engaging physicians in education can be challenging. A growing literature suggests that doctors respond well to podcasts.1 With that said, there is a scarcity of this type of educational material in the mental health field. Indeed, while podcasting is common in areas like emergency medicine,^{2,3} little has been done to create accessible and easy-to-follow professional learning and knowledge exchange in psychiatry.

To fill this void, a new podcast series, "Quick Takes: A Podcast for Physicians by Physicians," launched in October 2018 with Dr. David Gratzer, an award-winning educator, serving as host, with production support from CAMH Education. In each podcast, Dr. Gratzer interviews experts, offering information in a question-and-answer format.

About the podcast

The goals of the podcast are to:

- Create and evaluate a podcast series to educate time-limited CAMH physicians, residents and hospitalists
- Focus on mental health and addiction issues that are relevant to physicians
- Be short and easily digestible, while delivering quality training that physicians can immediately implement in their practices
- Promote ongoing knowledge exchange activities within CAMH: the podcast will be hosted on the Portico Network, with each episode linked to additional resources.

The podcasts run an average of 17 minutes and conclude with one minute of rapid-fire questions. In-depth discussions on a topic are sometimes released as bonus episodes.

Impact

The podcast series is evaluated on an ongoing basis using several metrics (including downloads, Twitter engagement, the reach of our promotional e-mails), as well as learner feedback (through short surveys, which include the opportunity for comments).

Next steps

In addition to the on-going production of this podcast we will simultaneously be evaluating it on a regular basis.

We will use all data collected on user behaviour and consumption, and the feedback received from our short survey responses, to better understand the impact of the podcast series on clinical practice and to determine future topic areas.


